TRAFFIC CALMING

There are many streets in our neighborhood that are becoming unsafe with speeding vehicles. The speed limit in Sequoyah Hills is 30 MPH, unless posted otherwise. The speed limit on Kingston Pike is currently 45 MPH, with the exception of the curve east of Calvary Baptist Church which is 35 MPH.

Traffic calming involves education and steps of enforcement. It also requires developing a Traffic Calming Plan with the East Tennessee Design Center. If you have questions, or are interested in developing a plan for your neighborhood, contact annemtucker@yahoo.com.

NEIGHBORHOOD WATCH

Emergency 911

Police Non-Emergency 215-4010

In the past 2 months there have been 2 home invasions in Sequoyah Hills. If someone you do not know knocks on your door late at night, CALL 911, preferably from a land line phone so that your correct street address can be tracked by the 911 system.

REMINDER: DO NOT leave valuables in parked cars - most items that are stolen come from cars with items left in plain sight. REPORT ALL signs of criminal activity to the Police Non-Emergency number 215-4010 so that crime trends can be tracked and police patrols can be increased when necessary.
